



#### Creed:

Never permit me to be separated from you.





**Postlude:** Toccata on "O Filii et Filiae" Lynwood Farnam

**Jean-François Dandrieu** (1682-1738) became organist at the Church of Saint Merry in Paris in 1704 and in 1721 was appointed to the prestigious Chapel Royal. His compositions (primarily for organ and harpsichord) are among the most significant of the early Classical period. He was influenced by François Couperin. Dandrieu also wrote violin sonatas and other chamber music. Today's prelude is one of many settings of the Easter hymn, *Ye Sons and* Daughters. It utilizes the hymn as a rondo, with the newly introduced passages serving as the new music and the "Alleluia" sections serving as the repeating section even as they recall the just previously introduced material.

Lynwood Farnam (1885-1930) was born in Montreal and held several positions there. At his audition for the Church of the Emmanuel in Boston, he handed the search committee a list of two hundred compositions he played from memory and said, "any of these". He was awarded the position. He spent the next few years solidifying his reputation as a virtuoso organist. His next and final church position was at the Church of the Holy Communion in New York. He gained fame as a teacher in New York as well and was asked to head the organ department at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia. His dazzling career was cut short by liver cancer. Farnam is a legend in the organ world. He did no improvising, and his only published work is today's postlude, but he was counted among the greatest interpreters, attracting to his performances not only organists, but other leading musicians and a wide listening public.

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
